About the book

This volume presents the second collection of Daniel Bikas Rugs, created during 2024–2025—a continuation and evolution of the journey that began with the 2020–2023 collection. While the earlier body of work introduced a new visual language within Persian handmade rugs, this collection deepens and sharpens that vision, moving with greater clarity toward purpose and meaning.

At the heart of this book lies the foundation of the Mission Art Movement, a concept fully introduced in the opening chapter. This movement defines art not as passive decoration, but as an active force—carrying intention, message, and responsibility. Each rug within this collection is conceived as a medium of communication, designed to engage with the viewer beyond aesthetics.

The works are presented in two distinct yet complementary categories. The portrait rugs demonstrate an extraordinary level of precision and craftsmanship, achieving a degree of detail that closely approaches photographic realism. These pieces honor individuals through form, texture, and depth, capturing not only likeness but presence.

In contrast, the abstract rugs explore a more interpretive and symbolic dimension. Woven primarily in silk, these works embrace a wide range of subjects—political, philosophical, social, and environmental—expressed through geometry, color, and composition. They invite reflection rather than recognition, opening space for personal interpretation and dialogue.

Together, these two directions form a unified narrative: one grounded in representation, the other in abstraction; one capturing the visible, the other revealing the conceptual. Both, however, are bound by a single intention—to redefine the role of the Persian handmade rug as a contemporary artistic medium with a mission.

Each piece, measuring approximately 30 × 40 cm, functions as a self-contained narrative. Though modest in scale, these works carry powerful and distinct messages, transforming every rug into a visual manifesto. Crafted with exceptional precision, the foundation of each rug is made entirely of silk, with both warp and weft providing a refined, luminous structure. Rising from this delicate base, the wool pile introduces texture, depth, and contrast—enhancing the visual language and giving each composition a tactile presence. This interplay between silk and wool mirrors the conceptual duality within the works: softness and strength, tradition and innovation, silence and statement.

Rooted in the heritage of Persian craftsmanship yet driven by a contemporary avant-garde vision, this collection challenges conventional expectations of textile art. 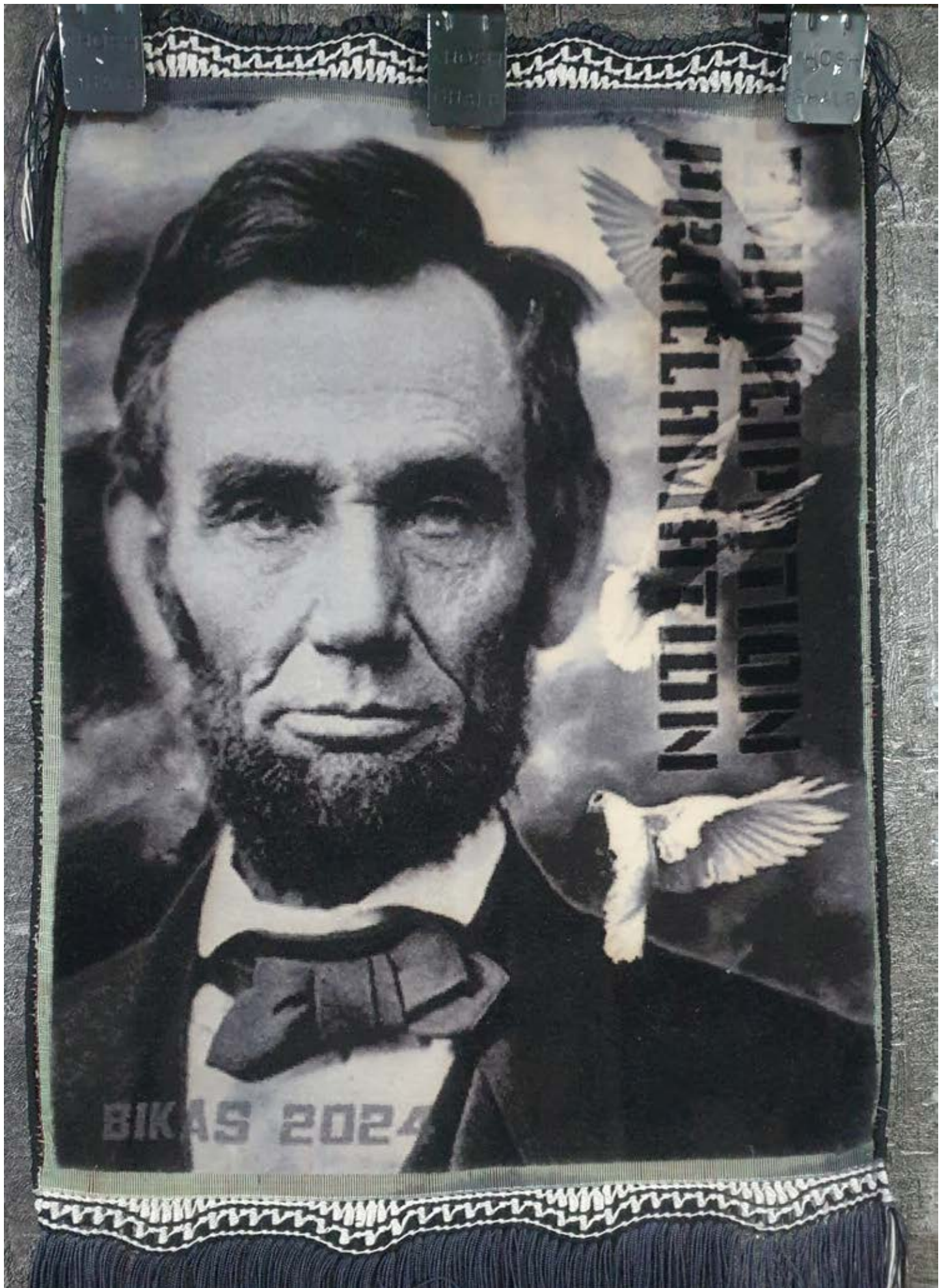

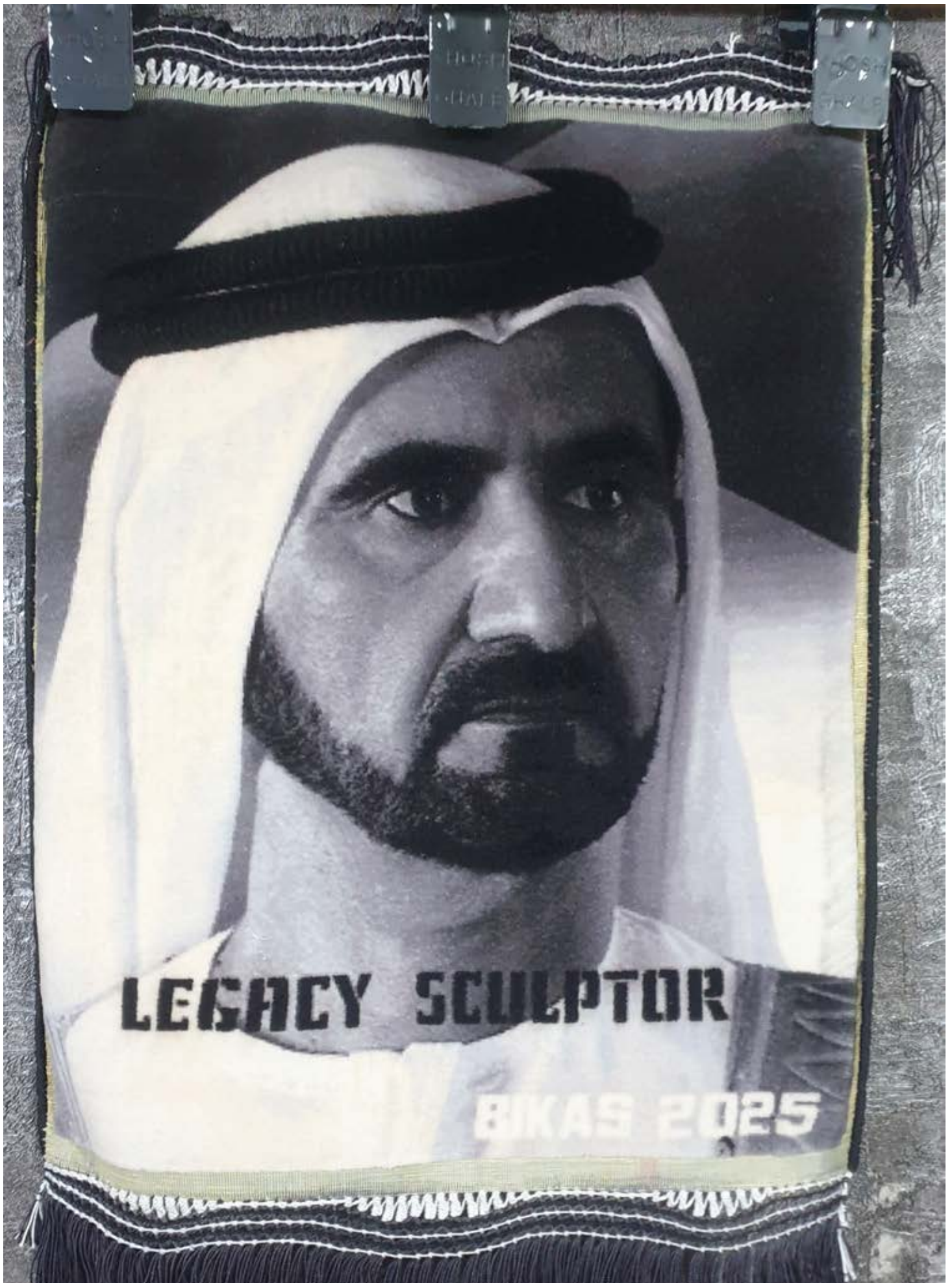

Deus Sive Natura

Deus sive Natura” is a Latin phrase meaning “God, or Nature”, and it is most famously associated with the 17th-century philosopher Baruch Spinoza. It appears in his major work, *Ethics*, where Spinoza uses it to express his pantheistic view of God and the universe.

Here’s the essence:

God and Nature are one and the same: For Spinoza, God is not a personal deity who intervenes in the world; rather, God is identical with the natural world and its laws. Everything that exists is a part of this single, infinite substance—Nature itself.

Everything is determined:

Since God/Nature is governed by immutable laws, everything that happens is a necessary outcome of these laws. There is no randomness or true “free will” in the human sense—everything unfolds according to the logic of Nature.

Ethical implications:

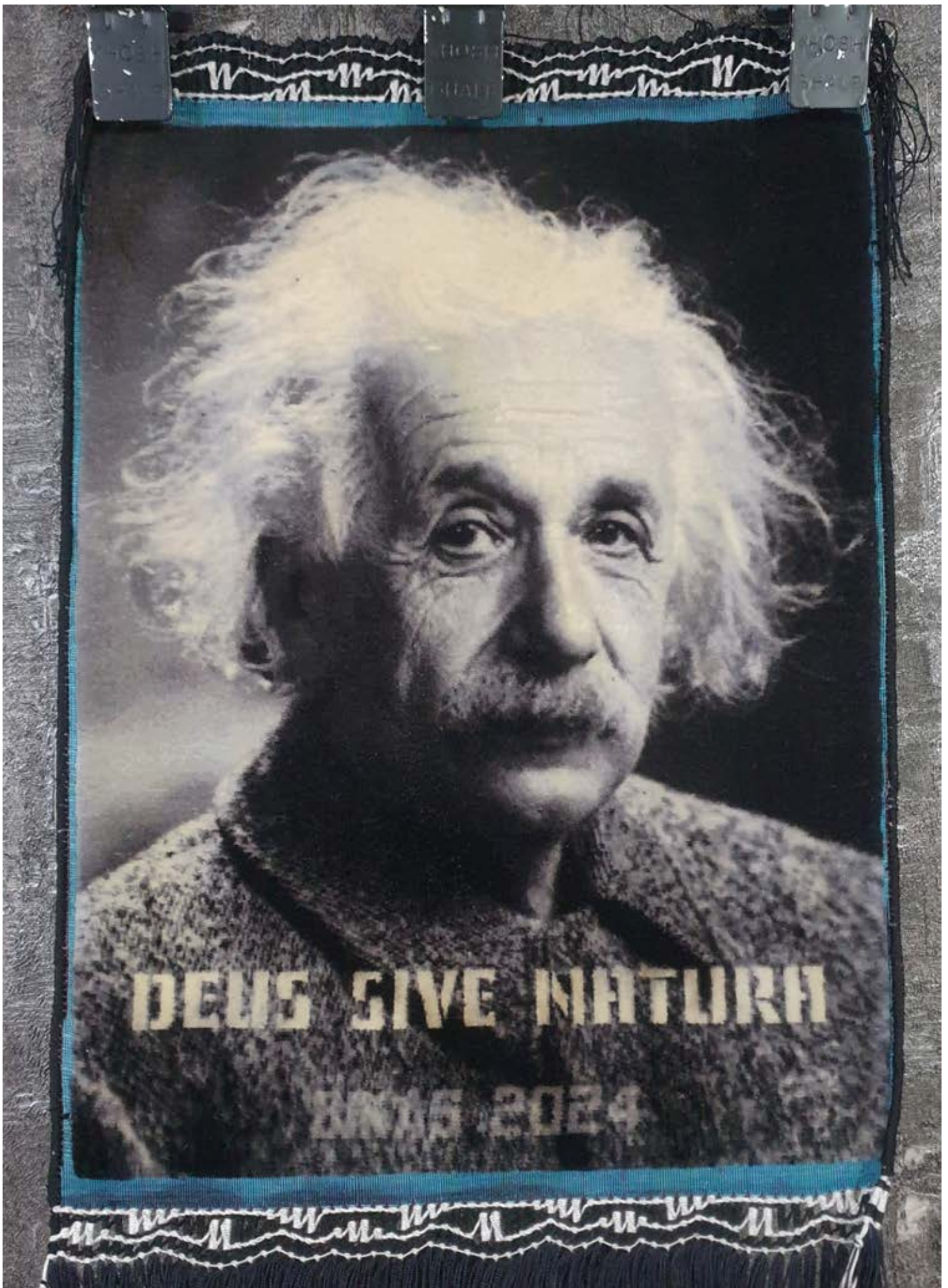
Determinism

Directly on top of this faint Roman text, the second writing emerges: the Braille translation, woven with wool in black and blue. Each tactile dot rises in small, deliberate bumps, creating an embossed surface that the fingers can read with certainty. While the sighted struggle to decipher the faded Roman letters, a blind reader can immediately access the meaning through touch. The Braille writing overlays the visual writing like a guiding hand, revealing what the eyes fail to see.

The interplay between the two writings—one barely visible, the other tangible and elevated—creates a powerful commentary on perception, privilege, and accessibility. The rug becomes a layered manuscript of human communication: the historical beauty of Roman script muted by darkness, and the clarity of Braille asserting itself above it, both literally and symbolically. A textile that speaks through contrast, texture, and hierarchy, it invites the viewer to reconsider which senses truly reveal truth—sight or touch.

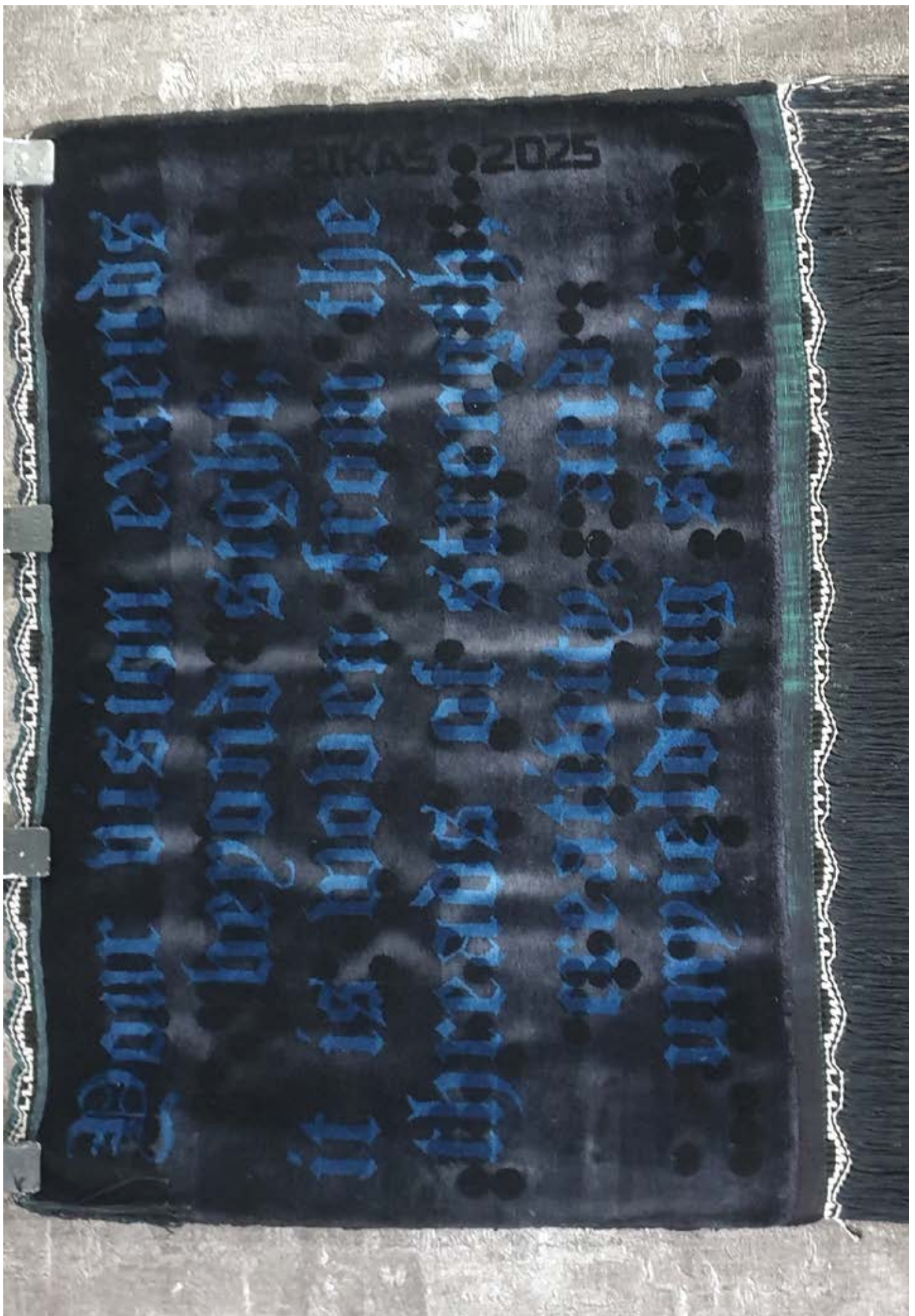

The work challenges conventional notions of accessibility in art and design, demonstrating how traditional Persian craftsmanship can engage multiple senses and create a more inclusive cultural experience.

Social harmony is often described as the ideal state of a society—one in which conflict is minimized, cooperation is maximized, and individuals feel a sense of belonging within a stable structure. A recurring argument in political philosophy is whether such harmony requires equality of status or, conversely, depends on the existence of hierarchy. The experience of the twentieth century, particularly under systems inspired by Communism, offers a powerful lens through which to examine this question.

Communism, as envisioned by Karl Marx and Friedrich Engels, sought to eliminate class distinctions and establish a classless society in which the means of production were collectively owned. In theory, this would remove exploitation, dissolve hierarchy, and produce genuine equality. Yet, in practice, attempts to implement this vision—most notably in the Soviet Union and the People's Republic of China under leaders like Mao Zedong—revealed a different reality. Instead

of eliminating hierarchy, these systems often replaced one form of hierarchy with another, frequently more rigid and less accountable. This historical contradiction highlights a deeper insight: hierarchy may not be an artificial imposition but an organic feature of human societies. Individuals differ in talents, ambitions, discipline, and creativity. These differences naturally lead to varying roles and, consequently, different levels of influence and recognition. A society that acknowledges this diversity can organize itself more efficiently, assigning responsibility and authority where they are most effective.

In such a framework, those “at the top” are not merely privileged—they are entrusted with greater responsibility. Leadership, whether in politics, business, or culture, demands decision-making, risk-taking, and accountability. Meanwhile, those in less prominent roles contribute in equally essential ways, forming the foundation upon which the entire structure stands. Social

harmony emerges not from erasing these distinctions but from aligning them toward a shared purpose.

The failure of communism to produce lasting harmony can be traced, in part, to its attempt to suppress these natural variations. By enforcing uniformity, it often stifled initiative, discouraged excellence, and concentrated power in centralized authorities. Ironically, the pursuit of absolute equality led to systems where a small elite controlled the state apparatus, while ordinary citizens had limited freedom or upward mobility.

In contrast, a society that accepts hierarchy—while ensuring fairness, transparency, and mobility—can foster both stability and dynamism. The key lies in preventing hierarchy from becoming tyranny. When individuals have the opportunity to rise based on merit, when institutions are accountable, and when dignity is preserved across all levels, differences in status do not

necessarily lead to division. Instead, they can create a balanced ecosystem of roles and contributions.

This perspective does not dismiss the moral concerns that gave rise to communism. Inequality can indeed become unjust and destructive if left unchecked. However, the solution may not be to eliminate hierarchy altogether, but to refine it—to create systems where leadership is earned, power is limited, and every individual is respected regardless of position.

Ultimately, social harmony is less about flattening society into sameness and more about orchestrating its differences into coherence. A structured inequality, tempered by justice and opportunity, may prove more sustainable than an enforced equality that contradicts the realities of human nature.

Social Harmony

This exceptional Persian silk rug presents a striking visual narrative through the language of abstraction and symbolism. Across its luminous surface, human presence is reduced to pure geometry—circles and rectangles in varying sizes, colors, and densities—scattered dynamically throughout the composition. Each form suggests individuality within a collective, evoking the diversity of human roles and statuses within society.

Anchoring this field of abstraction is a powerful symbol embedded in the background: a scale representing justice. Unlike the surrounding silk elements, the scale is rendered in wool, creating a subtle embossed effect that elevates it physically and conceptually from the surface. This contrast in material introduces depth and hierarchy, drawing attention to the enduring presence of balance and judgment within the social structure.

The interplay between silk and wool not only enriches the tactile experience but also reinforces the thematic tension between fluid individuality and structured order. Light interacts differently with each material, causing the geometric figures to shimmer while the scale remains grounded and pronounced.

Wisdom is a full silk Persian rug conceived as a symbolic and philosophical composition. At its center, the Square and Compass face one another in deliberate balance, with the Eye of Providence positioned between them, signifying insight, consciousness, and higher awareness. The Seven Liberal Arts (Grammar, Logic, Rhetoric, Geometry, Arithmetic, Astronomy and Music) are intricately woven in wool onto the Square and Compass, their texture subtly raised above the luminous silk background, creating both visual and tactile distinction. This contrast emphasizes the primacy of knowledge, discipline, and intellectual mastery.

The rug is constructed through 33 distinct layers, representing the highest degree of Freemasonry. Each layer is woven in a different color, beginning from a single line and culminating in the 33rd line of weaving, symbolizing progression, initiation, and ascension through knowledge.

This piece has been created in deep respect for the values, symbolism, and philosophical foundations of Freemasonry, not as a decorative object alone, but as a contemplative work of art. Wisdom would be especially suited for display in Masonic lodge halls, museums, or cultural exhibitions, where symbolism, heritage, and meaning are honored.
